WHO WE SERVE: In last month's report I shared about who SKIFF serves – primarily the children of soldiers pulled away from their families by military duty. But, there is another segment of the population that SKIFF also serves – homefront parents. Homefront parents are the men and women left behind as essentially single parents for a season while their spouses are away from home serving. These homefront parents do all the child-rearing, all the shopping, all the laundry, make all the practices and games, all the doctor visits, and more.

Until I began conducting SKIFF trips routinely in 2009, I never appreciated how many such homefront parents can use a bit of respite now and then. This is especially true in families where there are multiple young (below school-aged) children who demand constant supervision. Upon returning to the dock from a SKIFF trip with her 7-year-old son, one boy's mother (who sent her son with me while she stayed behind, and who used onpost childcare for her two younger children on Fort Hood) came to tears thanking me for taking her son out. She told

me she really needed a break because the weather and the Christmas holidays had the family cooped up for a long time and she was really feeling the strain. I asked her what she did with the 3 or 4 hours she had to herself. I expected her to say she went shopping or met a girlfriend for coffee, but, she shared that she just feel asleep in her car in the parking lot overlooking the boat ramp – and that that was just what she needed. Wow! Until that moment I never realized this underlying value in what we provide to military families.

NOVEMBER WAS A WASH, LITER-ALLY: After the rains of 16-20 October which washed out a bridge on the Llano River and raised the two lakes I conduct SKIFF trips on (Belton and Stillhouse) by right at 20 feet, there was not much fishing to be done in the month of November with children on board.

Both lakes' ramp were shut down by the Corps of Engineers for a spell, then one ramp opened at the Union Grove Park on Stillhouse by mid-month. Even so, the fishing was still off due to an abnormally high flow of water through the lake.

On the Wednesday before Thanksgiving the first boat ramp to re-open on Lake Belton came online, followed by several others late in the week thereafter.

With shortened daylight hours now, SKIFF trips are practically limited to Saturdays as after-school trips are typically no longer doable.

I have 3 families now on standby for SKIFF trips and hope to whittle down that list as the kids have time off from school over the upcoming Christmas holidays. As always, thank you for your donations and fundraising efforts. It benefits whole families, not just the kids catching fish.
