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
President's Message by David Bush

SKIFF Program by Bob Maindelle

Dear Friends of S.K.I.F.F.,

In late May I set aside days on my June calendar specifically for SKIFF program trips and, with the help of Mrs. Denise Igo who administers the Fort Hood Area Events Facebook page, made the public aware of these dates.

In reply to this posting, I got the following text on June 4th:

Hello, sir! My name is Maria. I was a former military wife. Your info was shared on our neighborhood website about taking military kids for a fishing trip. I have a son who would be ecstatic to go. He has been asking to go fishing since him and his Daddy used to fish a lot. That was their bonding moment. My husband died a year ago from suicide due to PTSD while active duty at Fort Hood. It has been a tough one for the family especially the kids since they were very close to him. They always fished with him all the time. I don't know much about fishing. Trying to learn so I could take him sometimes. This would really mean a lot for him since this is what he asked for his birthday this month. Thank you for offering this to military children. Such a great thing to do. Hopefully he can go. Thank you for all you do. --Maria Reynolds

Thanks to your support, I was able to immediately reply to Maria by phone, letting her know that I would be able to take nine-year-old Bryson fishing. As we conversed, I learned that Bryson had two other siblings, whom I invited as well. On Saturday, June 12th, Bryson, one of his sisters, Makenna, and his mom all came aboard and we headed out fishing on Stillhouse Hollow Reservoir.

The children's father, Sergeant First Class Brad Reynolds, was age 38 on May 13, 2020, the day he passed away. Sergeant First Class Reynolds served as an Army aviation helicopter mechanic.

Maria, originally from the Philippines, is a nurse working in the endoscopy department at Advent hospital in Killeen.

Around 6:30 a.m. we shoved off from the courtesy dock in search of fish. The kids quickly got the hang of working the MAL Lure so as to get the spinner blade working efficiently as we did a "practice

round" near the courtesy dock before taking our act out on the road and trying to catch fish.

We fished one general area, making a few short hops to stay up with the fish, from our trip's start to around 8:55 a.m. when the white bass bite shut down pretty quickly for us. During this time the kids successfully worked their MAL Heavy Lures vertically to the tune of 51 white bass and 1 freshwater drum taken from out of 40 feet of water. Thanks to pretty grey, murky skies, the bite got off to a slow start, but, by 7:30, it was off to the races for a solid 70+ minutes of catching as fast as the kids' sore wrists would allow. A few times I had to change spinning reel handles to the opposite side of the reel so the kids could give their wrists a break.

Just for variety's sake, we did a bit of downrigging after the white bass shut down. We picked up one white bass that way and then changed over to sunfishing for the remainder of the morning.

Heading up into flooded brush, we broke out the long poles and presented live bait under floats for bluegill, redear, and longear sunfish. The kids landed 11 sunfish before Makenna gave out right around 10AM as the hot, humid weather and early wake-up began to take its toll. Bryson lasted another 10 minutes and we then decided to wrap it up and enjoy a cooling, breezy ride back in to the boat launch.

The kids wound up catching a total of 64 fish.

Again, thank you for your ongoing support of the SKIFF program so outings like this can take place.

For the past 5 years, I have been a volunteer Team Leader with Project Healing Waters, Austin. We meet every Friday from 7 to 11 am at a private ranch outside San Marcos. The ranch has a large tank that is used to irrigate the grass fields and it is stocked with perch, crappie, bass, carp, and catfish. In addition, this 3,000 acre farm is located along San Marcos River with access to fly fishing from the river banks and in kayaks. Every week, anywhere from 3 to 20 Vets with disabilities show up. During our get togethers, the vets are in a supportive environment and able to talk about their experiences while learning to fly fish.

HEALING WATERS

As a volunteer Team Leader, I help the vets learn to tie flies, cast, rig rods, and catch fish. One of the perks of volunteering at the project is that I get to fish after completing my teaching duties. A couple of weeks ago after I completed my work with the vets, I was casually fly fishing the tank with my 3wt TFO rod hoping to hook up a perch or other small fish to entertain myself. All of a sudden, as I was retrieving my fly I felt an enormous tug and my reel started to sing. This certainly wasn't the perch I was expecting. As 6 guys looked on, I attempted to keep this monster hooked up without breaking my 4 Ib tippet. I am not sure how long it took, but I almost ran line out to backing 3 times before I got him to shore. I am guessing that carp weighed somewhere from 8 to 10 pounds -I'm going with 10lbs. This carp is my all-time best. I have been trying to catch a big fish from the tank for the last few Fridays with no luck. On a day when I was completely unprepared to catch a big one, I landed this one. What can I say, I was very lucky.

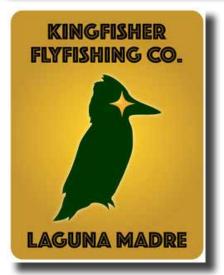
