
we spoiled brunch for the wolves.

There were so many you had to try and cast where less fish were to avoid foul hooking them. A highlight was seeing the surface takes of large pink poppers, some tied by Jack Lehman...Kathi called them "Popper Slammin' Salmon". Four days into our trip, a nice hike up the valley from camp provided Dolly Varden fishing.

The last two days we took helicopters to the bays above and below camp. The fishing was incredible every day. The last day was beautiful and sunny and everyone caught large Silver Salmon all day long. The water was clear and well lit so you could see the fish follow and take the fly. I highly recommend this trip.





# **Doug and Tania's Alaskan Vacation**by Doug Klerklewski


I was planning to take a fishing trip this year, and thought that Montana sounded like a good place to get some good fishing time in, and get away from work. Tania suggested we go to Alaska because it had been 5 years since we were there last, and I said, "okay, that sounds good, let's go!". We went to the usual tourist locations such as Denali National Park and the Kenai Fjords glacier sightseeing tour first. We saw lots of caribou, grizzly bears, Dall sheep, and moose in Denali, and we were fortunate enough to get to see Denali Peak on a clear day. On the Kenai fjords tour we saw humpback whales, orcas, sea lions, bald eagles, and puffins. Our tour boat took us to a beautiful glacier, which happened to "calve" just as we were leaving.

We fished nearly every creek/river between Denali and Anchorage, catching pink salmon and Coho salmon. On one creek I had a short run with a pike. From there we headed down the Kenai Peninsula towards the Anchor River. I caught pinks and silver (Coho) salmon on the Anchor, but the steelhead weren't running yet. Next, Tania and I did a half-day trip on the Kenai River. I caught rainbows and Dollies, and Tania caught rainbows, dollies and a rare grayling. The owner of Troutfitters Fly Shop and our guide both said they had only seen a couple of grayling caught on the Kenai River in many years.

We fished the Russian River for a couple of days, catching rainbows, dolly vardens, and silvers. Tania was casting to salmon in a pool, when I heard a couple of "ruff ruff" noises like a dog would make, and I looked around and I didn't see anything. I heard the "ruff" again, and looked up across the river and saw a female grizzly bear on the opposite bank, about 30 feet away. We walked downstream to get out of the river, and she followed us until we exited the river. Then she turned and walked into the woods before I could get a picture of her. Tania didn't want to hang around for any pictures!

As a highlight on the drive back to Anchorage, we saw mountain goats on the cliffs right above the road near Beluga Point. It was great to get away from work for a couple of weeks!





# The Fly Tyer's Comer by Jim Gray & Jeff Hoelter

#### The Llanolope

**W**e are republishing this fly that was originally featured in our July 2012 newsletter because it is very effective in our local waters and the Hill Country. For a video presentation of Matt Bennett tying this fly, go to <a href="https://vimeo.com/75593711">https://vimeo.com/75593711</a>

The Llanolope, was inspired by Capt. Scott Sparrow's VIP, but uses foam cylinders for the head and antelope hair for the body. The round foam head makes a durable fly that is easier to tie and trim, and twists less in windy conditions. I like using yellow

foam and natural hair colors which imitate grass hoppers that are common on the banks of the Llano and other local rivers.

#### **Materials**

Hook: Gamakatsu B10S Stinger hook size 4 to size 6

Thread: Ultra Thread 210


Tail: Natural deer body hair

Body: Natural antelope body hair

Head: Foam cylinder 5/16 for size 6; 3/8 for size 4

Eyes: 5 or 6mm doll eyes

Picture 1: Trim a 5/16 foam cylinder so you have a 45 degree angle at the front with a flat back. Push a bodkin needle through the foam just below the center point and set aside.



Picture 2: Start the thread just before the bend of the hook and make a small thread bump to help keep the tail and hair clumps from sliding off the back of the hook. Clean and stack a small bunch of deer body hair (about the size of a pencil) and trim to length. The tail should be about the length of the hook shank. Use deer for the tail because antelope isn't quite as durable Slide the hair in place over the hook and tie it in just in front of the thread bump. Hold this clump firmly to keep it from spinning around the hook while you tighten the thread. Move the thread forward and secure with a half hitch.



Pictures 3: Clean and spin a small clump of antelope hair in front of the tail.



Pictures 4: Compress this clump with a packer being sure to support the tail to keep from pushing everything off the back of the hook. Continue cleaning, spinning, and packing clumps of antelope until you have just enough room for the foam head.




Picture 5: Make sure you have enough space on the hook shank for the head you prepared in step 1. You can do this by laying the head against the hook shank to ensure it will fit.




### Fly Tyer's Corner Continued

Picture 6: Wrap the hook shank with several layers of thread to the hook eye, tie off and clip the thread. This thread base will provide a good surface for gluing the head.





Picture 7: Press the head over the eye of the hook and make sure it fits correctly. You can make minor adjustments by trimming the foam if necessary.



Picture 9: Trim the hair following the profile of the foam head. Be careful not to trim off the tail.





Picture 10: Using Krazy glue, attach a 5mm or 6mm doll eye to each side of the foam head. The completed Llanolope.

I recently had a trip to Sweden for work. On the weekend, a co-worker and I did a half-day trip with a guide I had used before to fish for pike in the Vaxon Archipelago. The guide was from "Catch and Relax" in Vaxon and provides fly fishing tackle. Vaxon is approximately 40 minutes by taxi from Stockholm, or a 30-minute boat ride. My coworker, who used a spinning outfit, got skunked, and I got lucky and caught 5 pike with my fly rod. Other fly fishing opportunities in Sweden include sea trout, rainbow, brown trout, salmon, and char.
