



March Speaker – Chris Johnson



Our speaker this month will be Chris Johnson. Chris is the owner and founder of Living Waters Fly Fishing, a fly shop and guide service based out of Round Rock, Texas. He has guided the Texas Hill Country for over a decade, and has fly fished the heart of the state for 20 years. Chris has been a licensed guide in Texas, Oklahoma, and Alaska. Chris is an IFFF Certified Casting Instructor, Umpqua Signature Fly Designer, Tenkara USA Guide, and TPWD Angler Educator. He is also a pro team member for Whiting Farms, Scott Fly Rods, and Scientific Anglers. Chris is dedicated to sharing his passion for the sport and investing in the next generation of fly anglers. He often is a featured presenter/fly tier at fly fishing, outdoor, and community events throughout the state.

Chris and his shop have also been featured in several outdoor publications including Trout magazine, Garden and Gun, and Tenkara Magazine. He was also awarded the 2014 Man of the Year from the IFFF Texas Council and in the same year, Living Waters was the recipient of the IFFF's prestigious Lee Wulff Award.

In addition to fly fishing, Chris is passionate about film and photography. He co-produced the short film "Unspoken," in an effort to raise awareness for Rio Grande Cutthroat trout conservation. As a result, Living Waters is working with Trout Unlimited as a Gold Level endorsed TU Business to restore Rio Grande Cutthroat throughout their native range.

Chris is happily married to his wife Emily and together they enjoy running the fly shop, fly fishing the world, and raising their daughter Lydia in the sport.

South Louisiana by Nils Pearson

Brandon Rabke and I began our fishing trip to South Louisiana with a flight into New Orleans on Fat Tuesday, 2018. We found our Southwest flight half full, probably because most of the travelers to this destination had already made their way to New Orleans to celebrate Mardi Gras days earlier. After renting a car, we drove south along the canals and marshlands of Louisiana, and by evening time we met up with **Capt. Baron Boyette**. Our energetic young host had arranged beautiful accommodations and after a night's sleep, we were out on the water the next morning.

On our first day, we faced wind in the teens, overcast skies, and murky water from the previous day's rain. Nonetheless, Capt. Baron took us to the dead end of a canal where we cast heavy flies on 8 wt rods. As we dragged the flies along the bottom, we got numerous hits and eventually landed 4, 20+ lb redfish. With these big fish, the first run is a reel-spinning journey into your backing. Once the run ends, comes the tricky part of retrieving line on a 20+ lb fish violently shaking its head and taking repeated short runs that challenge every bit of your skill to avoid breaking your 20lb tippet. Each fish we landed probably took in the neighborhood of 15 minutes to get to the boat. Capt. Baron hefted the chunky boys out of the water and into our hands for the mandatory pics.

After this morning workout, we went in search of clear water. After crisscrossing the marshes, we did come upon some bits of clear water but more often than not these areas weren't holding reds. The areas that did have reds usually had dirty water that made spotting fish impossible. And inevitably, the reds announced their presence with swirling water and puffs of mud as they took off.

We started out our second day in the same place as we fished on the first and dragged flies across the bottom. It took a couple of changes of flies before Capt. Baron found a flashy purple fly that enticed a couple of 20+lb reds to strike. However, very soon after we landed these big reds, the wind picked up and rain clouds moved in. A front had arrived and we quickly left this spot to get out of the rain.

Again, we crisscrossed the area looking for clear water. After little luck finding reds, Capt. Baron pushed on to a more distant area. As luck would have it, just after we arrived at our next spot

the afternoon sky cleared, the wind dropped, and we came upon gin clear water. We began our search for reds in 3-foot deep water sighting the occasional large red (30+ lb) but failed to hook any. Capt. Baron then poled us into a series of large lakes with clear water and sandy bottoms. As soon as we entered this area, we started to see 8-10 lb reds.

For the rest of the afternoon, the games were on. I quickly lost count of how many reds we got to the boat but we probably got about 20% of the 200 redfish we saw. It was one of those situations where the repeated use of our equipment and ourselves took its toll –Knots came untied, hooks were bent and broken, and our casting accuracy degenerated. But what fun! If we were better fly fishermen, we could have landed 100 reds.

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
