## President's Message by Matt Bennett

I feel like I'm on repeat yet again, but a very wet May forced us off the water for the most part. We had to cancel our Llano River Outing, which I am tentatively rescheduling for July 2nd. Additionally, the big Lower Colorado River Cleanup was canceled, and is rescheduled for 6/25. Hopefully the weather will cooperate a bit this month, but it does feel strange to complain about too much water given our water situation not too long ago.

Our Multispecies contest is ongoing for those who have been able to find some water to fish. On the conventional fly side, Steven Turner currently leads with 7 species, Charles Cresswell is 2nd with 6, and Ryan Kirkbride is 3rd with 4. There's five people tied with three each. On the Tenkara side, Rob Gonzalez is in the lead with 4, and two people are tied for 2nd with 2 year - Jacob Eikstead and Michael Kenny. The Llano outing would be a great place to add some numbers to your totals - just saying!

Speaking of the Llano, Dan Cone will be presenting this month on some of the water he fishes on the central and upper sections of the river. With the water we've had this year, it's much easier than in the past to get a kayak or something similar down the river. We'll see if we can nail down some float options and consider doing a Llano float, if there's interest. It's a great way to hit some of the water in-between access points that doesn't get fished as much.

As a reminder, the Destination Texas Fly Fishing Expo put on by the Texas Council will be September 9-10 in Grapevine. Kelly Galloup and Pat Cohen will be the featured guests this year - you'll remember Kelly from our February Presentation and Troutfest last year. If you've never seen Pat's deer hair work, you are in for a treat. I'm very excited about these guys coming down. Mike Morphew and I will also be featured tyer's at the event hopefully you won't let that stop you from coming out.

#### **June Speaker**

At our next meeting, Dan Cone will be presenting on fly fishing the Llano River. Dan grew up fishing on the Llano River between Mason and Kingsland. First with worms, hellgrammites and a Zebco 202, later progressing to roostertails, small crankbaits and ultralight rods. 

The girls' dad, U.S. Army Staff Sergeant Ochoa is currently deployed to South Korea where he serves as a mortarman in an infantry unit.




## The Fly Tyer's Corner Photos and Recipe by Jim Gray


#### Jim's Big-Eye Popper

Compared to many other fly tiers, I don't tie a lot of different patterns. I have 30 or so "go to" patterns that cover most of my fishing - fresh and salt. It may seems like a lot, but when you think about all the different fish that we target, it's not all that many. In order for me to add a new pattern, it has to be something special. It must be effective, easy to fish, versatile and easy to produce. It also has to look good in my fly box. The Big Eye Popper checks all the boxes. Poppers are great producers on our local rivers, and some of the easiest flies to

Step 1: Shape the popper body. Most of my poppers are made from shaped closed-cell foam. The popper body in this photo was made from a flip-flop. To shape the poppers, use a dremel tool and an emory board. Use a sanding stone to create a cupped face. If you don't have the tools to create the foam cylinders, you can buy them from most fly shops.



Step 2: Once the body is shaped, use a small dremel sanding stone to create a recess at the back of the fly. This will help you hide where you tie in the tail.




Step 3: Use a bodkin or heavy needle to poke a hole through the center of the popper body. Slide the body onto the hook and determine the best place to tie in the thread base so the tail will be covered by the recess at the rear of the foam body.

fish, and this fly is very versatile. You can tie it in almost any size and color, fishing for all kinds of fish. Finally, the materials list is short and inexpensive.

#### Materials

Hook - Gamakatsu B10S size 4 Thread - Ultra Thread UTC 140 Denier Body - 7/16" foam cylinder, shaped Tail - deer hair Eyes - 8mm doll eye



Step 4: Tie in the thread base and then tie in a clump of stacked deer hair for the tail. I like a heavy tail, and use a clump a little less than the size of a pencil. Hold the hair in place on top of the hook. You aren't trying to "spin" the hair, you want it to stay in place.



Step 5: Wrap thread over the butts of the deer hair so it will easily fit into the recess at the rear of the popper body.



## Fly Tyer Cont.

Step 6: ATo create a good base for the foam to be glued to, tie in a thread base over the hook. I go over the hook 3 or 4 times to make sure the foam body can be secured.



Step 7: Slide the popper body over the hook and rest it on the eye. Coat the thread with Krazy Glue. I also put glue in the foam body recess to make sure the tail is secured. Once you brush on the glue, you only have a few seconds, so be ready to push the popper body back onto the tail as soon as the glue is applied.



Step 8: Apply a small drop of Krazy Glue to the side of the popper body and press on the doll eye. Hold the eye down for 10 seconds to make sure it's secure.



Step 9: You can adjust the hook, foam and eye size to make flies in all different sizes and colors.





#### Organizing Your Dubbing

At the last meeting I was asked by a member to demonstrate dubbing techniques Which prompted me to this month's tying tip

I am sure many of you have dubbing boxes or draws full of dubbing packs. I came up with an idea many years ago that has kept my dubbing in good order and I use it like a painter uses his pallet. It is a cheap storage method and makes choosing a shade and type very easy.

I use a ring binder and purchase plastic coin holder inserts, I find each compartment takes the average packet of dubbing and it is very easy to pull the required amount for each fly.

Mixing is easy as all colors are there to hand, I keep natural, synthetic separate and have separate inserts for specials like real seals fur.
