This Wednesday, March 20th, the Yeti Flagship Store is holding a Businesses for Bristol Bay event. This celebration is focusing on Bristol Bay's world class fisheries and the many businesses that depend on these treasured fishing grounds. 

Parking Info:



I spent the better part of a day out with Pat Vanek of Bosque Valley Fly Fishing looking for some early white bass on the North Bosque River. It took us until early afternoon to really locate them, but we

I spent the better part of a day out with Pat Vanek of Bosque Valley Fly Fishing looking for some early white bass on the North Bosque River. It took us until early afternoon to really locate them, but we managed to catch a handful in a couple hours. Pat said it was pretty slow by his accounts, but I had a blast. His jet boat allowed us to venture upstream through some rapids, above where most other fisherman are able to go. Unfortunately, due to a cool front, the white bass we found were located down the rapids, so we competed with a dozen or so other boats throughout the day. I never saw anyone else catch a fish though.

Pat's Ghost Minnow was the magic fly, and he was easily able to keep me in prime position to swing it through the deeper run to where the fish were stacked up. Along with the white bass, I caught a chunky Spotted Bass, and two very large Smallmouth Buffalo, which towed the boat around for quite a while before I was able to land them. Quite a fight on 8 lb tippet and a six weight!

Pat has always been a good supporter of the club and really knows his home river. I'd encourage anyone looking for a different style of spring bass trip to book a trip with him on the Bosque or Brazos once it warms up.





On December 2, 2018, Mrs. Lesa Rowell contacted me about planning a S.K.I.F.F. outing for her 8-year-old son, Jarrett Rowell. On a mild, foggy Saturday morning, February 2nd, AFF member Dave Bush and I welcomed Jarrett aboard for the first S.K.I.F.F. trip of the 2019 season. Jarrett had been patiently waiting for this trip since before Christmas, as foul weather forced two postponements.

There was a silver lining to Jarrett's cloud, however, in that on Sunday, January 27th, Jarrett's dad, U.S. Army Sergeant First Class (SFC) Matthew Rowell, redeployed to the United States from a split tour to Iraq and Kuwait as a field artilleryman.

We fished three distinct locations over the 4-hour span of the trip, amassing a catch of 82 fish.


At what we had determined would be our last stop of the morning, we found scattered white bass in nearly 50 feet of water beneath gulls which looked like they had been feeding well, but which were now letting up, indicating the gamefish were no longer aggressively pursuing the baitfish.

We dropped our slabs to bottom and began to use a snap-jigging tactic. Dave Bush hooked a fish which got other nearby fish excited, igniting a brief flurry. SFC Rowell was the next one to connect with a fish - another white bass.

Just as I unhooked and released that fish, Jarrett set the hook on another fish and we all watched his rod bow deeply, submerging his rod tip beneath the water.

Because we had already landed a number of sizeable drum up to 3.50 pounds which behaved likewise, we all assumed the fish was another large freshwater drum.

Unlike drum, however, this fish began to move out away from the boat. Jarrett iust held on with his left hand and reeled

the light Pflueger spinning reel with his right. There was a good bit of give and take, and the fish pulled line off the reel against the drag a number of times.

Eventually, thanks to some solid coaching by his dad, Jarrett worked the fish to the surface where I stood ready with the net. I slipped the net under the large blue catfish and brought it into the boat.

Using a scale certified by the Bastrop Scale Company which I always keep on board, Bush verified the weight of the fish at 5.25 pounds. Then, using the Check-It Stik which I have permanently mounted to the deck of my boat, Bush also verified the length of the fish at 23.375 inches.

This fish qualified as a new lake record in the Junior Angler category for that species of catfish. The Junior Angler category is open to those anglers under the age of 17 who are not yet required to possess a fishing license.

That very same day we completed the required application and sent it, with several required photographs, to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in Austin,

to the attention of the Angler Recognition Program. On February 21st, Ron Smith of TPWD verified the record was legitimate and issued the certificate.

Jarrett received the certificate on Feb. 23rd, to which a gold Seal of the State of Texas was affixed, documenting his catch. His achievement will also appear in electronic format on the TPWD website until such a time as a larger fish is landed by a junior angler

As the trip concluded, we presented Jarrett with his own tacklebox with an assortment of gear inside, a closed-faced rod and reel, and a red, logoed S.K.I.F.F. ballcap, all provided via the efforts of Dave Hill and Manuel Pena of AFF.

We now have two more SKIFF trips pending for the Williams family of Harker Heights and the Cobian family of Killeen. Weather has forced postponement for both families once already. I will begin running after-school trips following the Daylight Saving Time change on 10 March, thus giving families with kids other than a Saturday option for their SKIFF trip.
