
Troutfest by Juan Shappard

Colorado River Outing -Saturday, April 18 by Juan Shepperd

Float and fly fish from Little Webberville Park to Big Webberville Park. This stretch of water is close to Austin, TX. From Austin, take MLK Road, drive East and it will turn into FM 969. Little Webberville Park (100 Water Street, Webberville, TX 78621) is located on the banks of the Colorado River in the town of Webberville, about 20 miles East of Austin.

There is free parking and a public boat ramp. Big Webberville (Both parks are free, have public boat ramps, are limited day use only (no camping), and both close at twilight. It is an easy 5 mile float between the 2 parks. The Colorado River flows downriver, from Little Webberville Park to Big Webberville Park, and there are no major rapids or dams through this stretch. You may go as fast or slow as you wish. At this time of year, there should be some hungry bass, sunfish and catfish – so take your time and enjoy fishing. Bring plenty of water, a hat, sunscreen, cooler with food and drinks, first aid kit, insect repellent, camera, change of clothes & a lifejacket.

Food: Pack a cooler. Lunch on your own on the River.

Safety: Colorado River flows in winter average 300-500 cubic feet per second (cfs). In Spring-Summer-Fall, 800-1500 cfs may be normal. It all depends on rainfall and what LCRA does to the Dams upriver. Find here https://hydromet.lcra.org/

Don't have a boat? Cook's Canoes (Neal Cook 512-276-7767) rents canoes & kayaks and runs shuttles. \$50 per day for tandem boat. \$35 per day for solo boat. \$20 shuttle. *Rental includes canoe or kayak boat, PFD (lifejacket), paddles and shuttle. This is should be a relaxing float. There are a few islands where you can get out and wade fish, if you want. The land above the Riverbank is private. Please respect private property by not trespassing or littering.




