

President's Message by Kathi Harris

A Fall is coming! Labor Day to Thanksgiving is typically the best time of year to fish Central Texas and the Texas coast. September is still warm enough for plenty of bass action, October is peak redfish time and November brings us into trout stocking season. There's a couple of events coming your way to get you ready to go fishing. First, we are hosting a free casting class on September 15th conducted by certified casting instructor and club member Austin Orr. Next, Texas Hill Country Fly Fishers is hosting their annual Oktoberfisch event in Kerrville on October 21-23, where you can attend hands-on classes and seminars led by pro-level fly fishing experts and authors. Recommendation: Try the Seaguar knot for leader to tippet connections or as a blood knot alternative when building leaders. This knot was designed by line manufacturer Seaguar to connect monofilament to fluorocarbon and reportedly retains 97 percent of the line strength. Blt's easier to tie than the blood knot although the finished product is not as pretty. Just Google Seaguar Knot for plenty of how-to videos or go to Seaguar.com. Another tip I picked up from their site is to use Chapstick to moisten the knot. Honestly, I'm a little skeptical about that, but as someone who really doesn't like spitting on the line. I'm willing to give it a try. I'll let you know how it goes.

Casting Session by Austin Orr

The goal of the evening of casting is to provide realistic scenarios for teaching purposes. Beginners and advanced casters alike will gain valuable insight and get to practice casts that are necessary in the wild. We will cover situations ranging from tailing redfish to skipping a popper under a riverbank tree branch. Austin will be on hand to discuss these scenarios and ways to approach each one. There will be plenty of time to ask questions.

Austin Orr was given his first fly rod at the age of 9 and never looked back. After arriving in the Corpus Christi area in 2008, he spent a decade exploring and fishing all the flats, beaches, jetties and nearshore rigs that he could walk, paddle or motor to. In 2011 he earned his Casting Instructor certification from Fly Fishers International. In his day job, Austin works with TPWD Fisheries Management in San Marcos, helping assure there are fish and beautiful places in which to catch them for generations to come. In keeping with his passion for teaching, Austin started Elevate Fly Casting in 2019 to provide a resource for dedicated anglers who'd like to level up their casting and fishing knowledge. SKIFF Program by Bob Maindelle

Dear Friends of S.K.I.F.F.,

Since my last update, I conducted three Soldiers' Kids Involved in Fishing Fun (SKIFF) trips during the month of August, bringing the total number of trips for the 2022 season to ten.

Trip #8 - 01 August, 2022

On Monday, August 1st, I conducted the eighth Soldiers' Kids Involved in Fishing Fun (SKIFF) trip of the 2022 season.

I welcomed aboard 10-year-old Braden Sepaugh, 7-year-old Tucker Sepaugh, and their mom, Mrs. Amber Sepaugh.

The boys' dad, U.S. Army Chief Warrant Officer 3 Aaron Sepaugh, a U.S. Army helicopter pilot, has served in the military for 14 years. He is deployed to Europe from Fort Hood. Mrs. Sepaugh will be teaching elementaryaged kids at Central Texas Christian School in Belton as the new school year begins.

This trip consisted of using a "smoking" tactic 100% of the time, for a catch consisting of 100% white bass — 83 of them to be exact. Smoking refers to racing an MAL Lure (inline spinner) up off the bottom to imitate the panicked flight of a small baitfish trying to elude a gamefish.

Trip #9 - 02 August, 2022

On Tuesday, August 2nd, I conducted the ninth Soldiers' Kids Involved in Fishing Fun (SKIFF) trip of the 2022 season.

I welcomed aboard 9-year-old Emerson Rayburn and her 7-year-old brother, Weston Rayburn. Prior to this morning's trip, neither child had ever caught a fish before.

The kids' father, U.S. Army Chief Warrant Officer Chris Rayburn is a fixed-wing aircraft pilot for the Army's military intelligence branch. He recently received orders taking him on a months-long mission to Africa.

Knowing he was going to be separated from his kids for quite some time to come, he contacted me to see if he could take a pre-departure fishing trip with them. We (the SKIFF organization) gladly granted that request.

We landed exactly 73 fish, and every last one of them came on a vertically worked MAL Dense Lure with chartreuse tail. We watched every fish we caught chase and overtake our lures on Garmin LiveScope. This technology allowed me to advise the kids on when to continue their retrieves and when to allow their lures to return to bottom — for this reason alone, it was invaluable.

Trip #10 -10 August, 2022

On Wednesday, August 10th, I conducted the tenth Soldiers' Kids Involved in Fishing Fun (SKIFF) trip of the 2022 season.

I welcomed aboard the Froschauer family including Abby (mom), and her daughters, 9-year-old Molly, and 8-year-old Rose.

The girls' father, U.S. Army Master Sergeant (E-8) Paul Froschauer, has been serving for 19 1/2 years. He is a part of the Army's Armor Branch and was recently deployed to Germany.

We caught white bass by working MAL Dense Lures vertically, and by using downriggers. We also went up shallow and fished for sunfish in the hydrilla. The girls' 60 fish tally included 32 sunfish, 2 freshwater drum, 2 largemouth bass, and 24 white bass.

For those new to SKIFF, SKIFF is an acronym for Soldiers' Kids Involved in Fishing Fun. It is a program now in its 13th year, sponsored by the Austin Fly Fishers, and supported by the McBride Foundation, the Sun City Rod and Gun Club, the Sun City chapter of Women Helping Others (WHO) and a number of supportive individuals, all of whom desire that kids separated from a parent by that parent's military duty, be given an opportunity to experience the outdoors through fishing during that time of separation, free of charge. The program also offers a time of respite for the homefront parents who may need a short break from single-parenting.




